Catedral y Giralda

The Catedral de Santa María de la Sede is the largest Gothic church in the world and the third largest church after St Peter's in the Vatican and St Paul's in London. Built on the site of the main Almohad mosque, work began in the fifteenth century. Remains of the old mosque are still preserved including the Giralda, its minaret, which is the symbol of the city.






Archivo de Indias

A treasure behind every corner

The present-day districts of Santa Cruz, Santa María la Blanca and San Bartolomé make up what was once the old Jewish quarter of Seville. Vestiges of ancient times can still be found in its narrow streets, small squares and passages.

There is no doubt that the Callejón del Agua is a must-see street on your tour of the labyrinth of the Santa Cruz quarter. **Next to** the city wall, and parallel to the gardens of the Real Alcázar, this street was used to carry water from the Caños de Carmona to the Reales Alcázares, so its current name.



Iglesia del Salvador

The Church of the Saviour (Iglesia del Salvador), is the second most important church in the city after the Cathedral. It is located on the site of the ancient Roman Forum, where the largest mosque in the Caliphate era was later built in the ninth century. The present church is a seventeenth century creation in Baroque style.



Plaza de España / Parque MªLuisa

The Plaza de España is an emblematic monument of the city, designed by the architect Aníbal Gonzalez. Made of brick and beautiful ceramic panels was made as a palace square of 50.000m2. It was the headquarters of the Latin American Exhibition of 1929. Really a must of Seville together with Maria Luisa Park, that counts with an area of 340,000 m2. 

Flanked by the Museum of Popular Arts and Customs (Mudejar style) on one side and the Archaeological Museum (Renaissance style) on the other, the Royal Pavilion (Gothic style). It is one of the most beautiful squares in the city.



Pabellón de Brasil

(Vice-chancellorship of the University of Seville)

It is designed in the colonial style of the cities built by the Portuguese on the coast from 1580 onwards.

During the Ibero-American Exposition the pavilion exhibited various productive sectors of his country, such as coffee, wood, fibres, cocoa, furniture, rubber, automobiles, perfumery, etc.

Pabellón de México

It is inspired by the Mayan-Toltec culture of Yucatan. Its façade features reliefs with allegories and sculptures, and the interior was lavishly decorated and crammed with handicrafts for display. The building also has a back courtyard with a fountain, also with Mayan-Toltec motifs.

Pabellón de Colombia (Consulate of Colombia)

One of the most representative architectural jewels of the Ibero-American Exposition of 1929. This building, which today serves as the headquarters of the Colombian Consulate General in Seville, was designed by the Spanish architect José Granados de La Vega and is beautifully decorated with symbolic pieces from the indigenous Colombian cultures.

Pabellón de Marruecos (Provincial parks and gardens of Seville)

It is a beautiful but simple pavilion, eclectic in style, reminiscent of the mosques of the African country. The decoration is reminiscent of the Muslim world. The ceilings of both the rooms and the gallery have polychrome coffered ceilings. The paving in the gallery and entrance is mosaic, as are the skirting boards on the walls and columns in the courtyard.

Pabellón de Argentina

(Dance conservatory)

It is neo-baroque in style, although it includes some Ibero-American and mestizo elements. Among its special features are the façade, which is very elaborate, as if it were a great baroque altarpiece, as well as the wooden coffered ceilings and columns, the tiles and the paintings by Gustavo Bacarisas in the decoration of the walls. It is currently home to the Professional Dance Conservatory Antonio Ruiz Soler, after the famous dancer from Seville.

Pabellón de Estados Unidos

(Madariaga Foundation of Contemporary Art)

With colonial overtones and decorations typical of large California buildings, it is a building with a floor plan in the shape of a regular triangle with chamfered corners, which includes a beautiful central courtyard inside. A second building, no longer standing, was a 350-seat cinema, where a number of films related to Latin America were shown. This pavilion currently houses the headquarters of the Valentín de Madariaga Foundation for Contemporary Art.

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Pabellón de Chile

(Art School of Seville)

It is the only avant-garde pavilion at the 1929 Exposition, with an Art Deco style, even in its decorative elements, such as the wrought ironwork. The building is intended to represent the Andean mountain range on one side and the coastal plain on the other, which is achieved by means of a composition of volumes with a constant staggering that culminates in its tower. This pavilion will be the most grandiose of those built by foreign countries for the event, with three floors and a 50-metre high tower; it is the largest of them.

Pabellón de Uruguay

(Vice-chancellorship of the University of Seville)

The building has a triangular floor plan, forming a 1,000 m² pavilion with two sheds for cattle and sheep, in which industrial, rural and manufacturing products were displayed, as well as aspects of the country's culture, art and administration. The main entrance is neo-baroque. It currently belongs to the University Community Assistance Service.
